

# Pets Lifeline to offer pet clinics

Pets Lifeline, in collaboration with Homeless Action Sonoma and La Luz, will offer two Mobile Community Pet Clinics focused on providing essential veterinary services to pets and families in need in Sonoma Valley. The first mobile wellness clinic will be hosted by Homeless Action Sonoma on April 16, from 11 a.m. to 2 p.m. La Luz will host the second clinic on April 23, 2024, from 12:00 pm to 3:00 pm. Both clinics will have the capacity to service 15 pets on a first-come, first-served basis.

Scheduled appointments and walk-ins are available. The mobile wellness clinics will offer a range of vital services including vaccinations, wellness checks, flea and tick prevention, microchipping, and referrals for further care. Additionally, Pets Lifeline will have educational handouts on topics such as parasite control on hand.

The professional staff overseeing these clinics are committed to delivering high-quality care. Leading the

team is Veterinarian Dr. Tiffany Newman, supported by Registered Veterinary Technician Denise Asaro, along with Pets Lifeline staff members Amy Mertens and Christina Leport.

A Spanish translator will be available to ensure effective communication with all attendees. Fees for these services will enable accessibility for all members of the community, ensuring that financial constraints do not hinder access to vital veterinary care for beloved pets.
