Explore Sonoma's rich past and Old West culture around the historic tree-filled Sonoma Plaza. Founded in 1835 when California was still a part of Mexico, the town's heritage is still evident today. An 18th century Spanish mission stands across the street, open for visitors to relive its past.

A block away, the Sonoma Valley Art Museum exhibits renowned works by regional, national and international modern and contemporary artists. He will discuss the recent changes and implications for American companies and the future of the US-China relationship.

The institutions and agreements that have grounded the modern international order show signs of weakness, while illiberal sentiment gathers strength across the West. With Russia's invasion of Ukraine, Hamas' terrorist attacks in Israel and their retaliatory assault on Gaza, Houthi attacks on Red Sea shipping, Iran expanding its influence in the Middle East, and China's harassment of international maritime routes, the world feels increasingly unstable and dangerous. U.S. foreign policy expert Kori Schake will explore current U.S. policies and alternatives facing the West.

Hampton Sides joins us in Sonoma to wrestle with Captain James Cook's complex and controversial legacy while providing a thrilling narrative of the herculean efforts and continual danger that characterized exploration in the 1700s. How did Cook, a dedicated scientist and unique among captains for his respect for Indigenous peoples and cultures, come to be killed in a conflict with native Hawaiians? Sides is renowned for his gripping stories depicting epic battles and expeditions of exploration and for offering an insightful examination of themes broadly relevant today.

ELLIOT ACKERMAN

Elliot Ackerman served five tours of duty in Iraq and Afghanistan, receiving the Silver Star, the Bronze Star for Valor, and the Purple Heart. He is currently a senior fellow in the Forward Defense program of the Atlantic Council's Scowcroft Center for Strategy and Security.

With co-author Admiral James Stavridis, Ackerman wrote the best-seller 2034: The Next World War and its newly released sequel, 2054. He has written additional acclaimed novels, including Halcyon, 2034, Red Dress In Black and White, Waiting for Eden, Dark at the Crossing, and Green on Blue, as well as the memoir The Fifth Act: America's End in Afghanistan and Places and Names: On War, Revolution and Returning. His books have been nominated for the National Book Award, the Andrew Carnegie Medal in both fiction and nonfiction, and the Dayton Literary Peace Prize, among others.

His fiction and essays have also appeared in *The New* Yorker, *The Atlantic, The New Republic, The New York Times* Magazine, Esquire, Time, and Harper's Magazine. He was a writer for Esquire and a contributor to *The Daily Beast, The* Atlantic, and *The New York Times*.

Ackerman graduated summa cum laude from Tufts University, and he holds a master's degree in international affairs from the Fletcher School of Law and Diplomacy. He also completed many of the United States military's most challenging special operations training courses.



AKHIL REED AMAR

Akhil Reed Amar is one of the most storied and influential professors at Yale Law School and one of the world's leading experts on the U.S. Constitution. Countless leaders in the legal profession, including several Supreme Court Justices, remember Amar's courses as among their most treasured memories of Yale.

Amar is the author of more than a hundred law review articles and several books, most notably *The Bill of Rights, America's Constitution, America's Unwritten Constitution,* and *The Constitution Today.*

His most ambitious book, *The Words That Made Us: America's Constitutional Conversation, 1760-1840*, unites history and law in a vivid narrative and tells the epic story of how America became America. He will share unexpected insights into some of the critical cases in front of the Supreme Court today.

Amar regularly testifies in front of Congress at the invitation of both parties and consistently ranks among America's five most-cited legal scholars. He has a weekly podcast, *Amarica's Constitution*, and a wide assortment of his articles, op-eds, and video links to many of his public lectures and free courses are online at akhilamar.com. He is a member of the American Academy of Arts and Sciences. He has written widely for popular publications, including *The New York Times, The Washington Post, The Wall Street Journal, Time*, and *The Atlantic*.

After graduating from Yale College, summa cum laude, in 1980 and from Yale Law School in 1984, and clerking for Judge (later Justice) Stephen Breyer, Amar joined the Yale faculty in 1985 at the age of 26.



ARTHUR BENJAMIN

Arthur Benjamin is both a professor of mathematics and a magician. He has combined his two loves to create a dynamic presentation called "Mathemagics," suitable for all audiences, where he demonstrates and explains his secrets for performing mental math faster than a calculator. He has presented his high-energy talk for thousands of groups throughout the world.

Benjamin has appeared on The Today Show, CNN, The Colbert Report, and National Public Radio and has been featured in over 100 newspaper and magazine profiles. In his Colbert Report interview, after joking around about which numbers are conservative and which are liberal, Steven Colbert surprised Benjamin with several math problems and had a calculator ready to verify his answers. He has given three TED Talks, viewed over 50 million times. His mission is to bring math to the masses in a magical way.

Benjamin's bestselling books include Secrets of Mental Math: The Mathemagician's Guide to Lightning Calculation and Amazing Math Tricks and The Magic of Math: Solving for X.

Benjamin earned a bachelor's degree in applied mathematics at Carnegie Mellon, as well as a master's degree and a Ph.D. from Johns Hopkins University. He has been a professor of mathematics at Harvey Mudd College since 1989.



TALMAGE BOSTON

Author Talmage Boston's varied experience and notable achievements as both a litigator and as a historian make him uniquely qualified to write *How the Best Did It: Leadership Lessons From Our Top Presidents*. The new book, released in April, takes the leadership lessons learn from our greatest presidents and makes them instructive today for all leaders who seek to enhance their performance.

Boston's other acclaimed books include *Cross-Examining History* (foreword by Ken Burns), *Raising the Bar* (foreword by former U.S. Attorney General Dick Thornburgh), *Baseball and the Baby Boomer* (foreword by Frank Deford), and *1939: Baseball's Tipping Point* (foreword by John Grisham).

One of the most highly recognized lawyers in Texas, Boston has been chosen for three major statewide awards in the last four years by the Texas Bar Foundation and the State Bar of Texas Litigation Section. Boston has been named a "Texas Super Lawyer" by Thompson Reuters every year since 2003 and among the "Best Lawyers in America" every year since 2013. He is the only lawyer to receive a "Presidential Citation" from eight different presidents of the State Bar of Texas for outstanding service to the State Bar.

Boston received his undergraduate and law degrees from the University of Texas, Austin. He is a partner at Shackelford, Bowen, McKinley & Norton, LLP in Dallas.



JEFFREY BROWN

Jeffrey Brown is Senior Correspondent and Chief Arts Correspondent for PBS *NewsHour*, public television's prestigious nightly news program viewed by millions. During his 30-year career with the *NewsHour*, he has served as co-anchor, studio moderator, and field reporter on a wide range of national and international issues.

Brown has interviewed numerous leading American and international newsmakers, moderated studio discussions on a vast array of topics, and reported from across the United States and other regions of the globe. As an arts correspondent, he has profiled many of the world's leading writers, musicians, and other artists. As senior national affairs producer for over a decade, he helped shape the program's coverage of the economy, healthcare, social policy, culture, and other areas. In addition, he leads *NewsHour*'s extensive coverage of arts and culture, called "Canvas." He also hosts the monthly book club, "Now Read This," a collaboration with *The New York Times*. His work as correspondent and producer has garnered the Peabody Award, a News & Documentary Emmy Award, and several Cine Golden Eagle Awards.

His acclaimed book of prose and poetry, *The News*, explores the intersections between politics and poetry. His poetry has been selected for inclusion in the Academy of American Poets' *365 Poems* anthology.

Before joining the *NewsHour*, Brown produced numerous public television series for Media & Society Seminars, an independent production company headed by Fred W. Friendly.

He attended UC Berkeley, Berkeley School of Law, and Columbia's Graduate School of Journalism.



KRISTIN CARLUCCI (WEED)

Kristin Carlucci grew up in McLean, Virginia, and attended Duke University and Johns Hopkins University, where she focused on international affairs and public policy. After working in policy research in the U.S. and Europe, including stints at the Rand Institute, she returned to Washington, DC, and settled with her US Air Force husband in 2020.

Her father, Frank Carlucci, was once called "Washington's ultimate survivor" by *The Washington Post*, and he served six presidents and ultimately rose to prominence as Deputy Director of the CIA and Secretary of Defense for President Reagan.

The highly anticipated new book *Get Me Carlucci* combines Carlucci's own words with interviews from his contemporaries and Kristin's context. The book is a unique look at the wide-ranging career of one of the twentieth century's most important behind-the-scenes actors, starting with Carlucci's childhood and early military days and continuing through his years helping define America's Cold War policy.

Frank Carlucci's work shaped the world. After graduating from the Princeton School of Public and International Affairs, he weathered the turmoil of the Congo Crisis in the 1960s as a young Foreign Service Officer. As Ambassador to Portugal in the 1970s, Carlucci played a crucial role in the country's transition to democracy. With a dynamic mind and a knack for building relationships, Carlucci returned to the U.S. to serve in a series of high-profile jobs in Washington. He defined American Cold War policy as Deputy Director of the CIA, National Security Advisor, and eventually Secretary of Defense under President Ronald Reagan. In private enterprise, he was Chairman of The Carlyle Group from 1992 to 2003.

Before he died in 2018, Frank Carlucci completed a draft of his memoir, which serves as the basis for *Get Me Carlucci: A Daughter Recounts Her Father's Legacy of Service*.



SECRETARY JOHN DALTON


John H. Dalton is a former Secretary of the Navy and emeritus member of the White House Historical Association's Board of Directors. He worked across private and public sectors and had four presidential appointments, all culminating in his appointment as the 70th Secretary of the Navy. His life is an inspirational story filled with successes and failures in both the public and private sectors and how he navigated through them.

Dalton's new memoir, *At the Helm: My Journey with Family, Faith, and Friends to Calm the Storms of Life*, recounts his experiences and the bedrock values that shaped him and the hard lessons he received from them...including the essence of principled leadership.

Dalton is a graduate of the United States Naval Academy. After graduating from Annapolis, Dalton served in the Navy from 1964 to 1969. He attained the rank of lieutenant while on active duty and was promoted to Lieutenant Commander while in the U.S. Naval Reserve. As Secretary of the Department of the Navy, including both the Navy and Marine Corps, Dalton had to weather the storm of the Tailhook controversy, navigate through the Naval Academy cheating scandal, and manage the new policies of Don't Ask, Don't Tell and women serving in combat. His record with these situations shines as a model of ethical leadership during crises. In 2016, he received the Distinguished Graduate Award from the Naval Academy.

The National Security Caucus recognized him as its 1997 International Security Leadership Award recipient. He is also an emeritus member of the White House Historical Association's Board of Directors.

Late last year, the Current U.S. Secretary of the Navy, Carlos Del Toro, announced that a new nuclear-powered submarine would be named the USS *John H. Dalton*.



WADE DAVIS

An acclaimed ethnographer, photographer, filmmaker, and writer, Wade Davis is widely considered one of the foremost thinkers of our time. His newest collection of essays, *Beneath The Surface of Things*, visits such varied topics as the demonization of coca, the sacred plant of the Inca; the Great War and the birth of modernity; the British conquest of Everest; the endless conflict in the Middle East; and reaching beyond climate fear and trepidation.

His 22 books include *One River, The Wayfinders*, and *Into the Silence*, winner of the 2012 Samuel Johnson Prize, the top nonfiction prize in the English language. His film credits include *Light at the Edge of the World*, an eight-hour documentary series written and produced for National Geographic. In his newly revised and updated treatise *River Notes: Drought and the Twilight of the American West*, Davis tells the story of America's Nile: how it once flowed freely and how human intervention has left it near exhaustion, altering the water temperature, volume, and local species.

Davis is one of 20 Honorary Members of the Explorers Club. He is the recipient of 11 honorary degrees, as well as the 2009 Gold Medal from the Royal Canadian Geographical Society, the 2011 Explorers Medal, the 2012 David Fairchild Medal for botanical exploration, the 2015 Centennial Medal of Harvard University, the 2017 Roy Chapman Andrews Society's Distinguished Explorer Award, the 2017 Sir Christopher Ondaatje Medal for Exploration, and the 2018 Mungo Park Medal from the Royal Scottish Geographical Society.

Davis holds degrees in anthropology and biology and received his Ph.D. in ethnobotany, all from Harvard University.

Born in British Columbia, Davis has worked as a logger, forestry engineer, whitewater guide, park ranger, and hunting guide. Today, he is a professor of anthropology at the University of British Columbia.



JONATHAN EIG

Jonathan Eig is the author of six books, four of which are *New York Times* best sellers. Ken Burns calls him a "master storyteller." His most recent book, *King: A Life*, a biography of Martin Luther King Jr., was nominated for a National Book Award and a Book Critics Circle Award, and just won the New-York Historical Society's 2024 Book Prize for the best work of American history or biography.

Joyce Carol Oates referred to Eig's book *Ali: A Life* as "an epic of a biography." The book won a 2018 PEN America Literary Award, and Esquire magazine named it one of the 25 greatest biographies of all time. Eig served as a consulting producer for the PBS series Muhammad Ali, directed by Ken Burns.

Eig's first book, *Luckiest Man: The Life and Death of Lou Gehrig*, reached No. 10 on *The New York Times* bestseller list and won the Casey Award. His books have been listed among the best of the year by *The New York Times, The Washington Post*, and *The Wall Street Journal*. His fourth book, *The Birth of the Pill*, will be staged soon as a theatrical production by TimeLine Theatre in Chicago.

Eig began his writing career at age 16, working for his hometown newspaper, The Rockland County (N.Y.) *Journal News*. He studied journalism at Northwestern University and worked as a reporter for *The New Orleans Times-Picayune, The Dallas Morning News, Chicago Magazine,* and *The Wall Street Journal.*

He has appeared on The Today Show, NPR's Fresh Air, and The Daily Show with Jon Stewart.



ALEX FILIPPENKO

Renowned UC Berkeley astronomy researcher and professor Alex Filippenko is the only person to have been a member of both teams that revealed the accelerating expansion of the Universe. This discovery was honored with the 2011 Nobel Prize in Physics to the teams' leaders, the 2007 Gruber Cosmology Prize, and the 2015 Breakthrough Prize in Fundamental Physics to all team members.

One of the world's most highly cited astronomers, Filippenko is an elected member of the National Academy of Sciences and the American Academy of Arts and Sciences and an elected American Astronomical Society Fellow. His scientific accomplishments, documented in more than 1100 research papers, have been recognized with numerous prizes. He also leads the world's most successful robotic search for exploding stars.

Filippenko has produced five video courses with The Great Courses, coauthored an award-winning astronomy textbook, and appeared in more than 120 television documentaries, including about 50 episodes of The History Channel series *The Universe*. He has also given more than 1,000 public presentations and was awarded the 2004 Carl Sagan Prize for Science Popularization.

In addition to writing and teaching a 96-half-hour lecture series on DVD called *Understanding the Universe*, Filippenko's other video courses include *Black Holes Explained* and *Skywatching: Seeing and Understanding Cosmic Wonders*. He co-authored the award-winning introductory textbook *The Cosmos: Astronomy in the New Millennium*.

Filippenko received a BA in physics from UC Santa Barbara and a Ph.D. in astronomy from CalTech, where he was a Hertz Foundation Fellow. He was a postdoctoral Miller Fellow at Berkeley and was appointed to Berkeley's faculty in 1986. He has won the university's most prestigious teaching awards and has been voted the "Best Professor" on campus a record nine times.



CRAIG FRAZIER

Craig Frazier has been illustrating the stories and communication of American businesses for the past 26 years. His illustration style is one of the most distinct and recognized in the country, characterized by humor, irony, and simplicity.

Frazier is an award-winning artist and graphic designer whose illustrations have been featured in the *New York Times, Time* magazine, and the *Wall Street Journal*. In 2003, he published a 176-page monograph titled *The Illustrated Voice*.

He is the author and illustrator of 12 children's books. His series of picture books about Stanley, a character who sees things differently, includes *Stanley Mows the Lawn*, which earned him the Society of Illustrators Silver Medal.

Frazier's new monograph, *Drawn*, was released in early 2024. It is a compendium of 45 years of illustration and design, featuring more than 400 illustrations and sketches curated from his long and illustrious career.

Frazier has received numerous awards from *Communication Arts*, The New York Art Director's Club, *Print Magazine*, Society of Illustrators, *American Illustration*, and *Graphis*. In 2013, he was published as one of the top 100 illustrators in *100 Illustrators* and featured three times in *Graphis* magazine in 2003, 2004, and 2018.

Frazier is a founding member of the San Francisco Chapter of the AIGA and served as its Treasurer in 1987. He is a frequent lecturer at universities and design conferences.



KER GIBBS

Having spent two decades in China, Ker Gibbs most recently served as President of the American Chamber of Commerce in Shanghai, where he focused on US-China relations and business issues facing American companies operating in Asia.

Gibbs is the author of *Selling to China: Stories of Success, Failure, and Constant Change.* He regularly contributes op-eds to *The Wall Street Journal, South China Morning Post,* and other publications.

He has served in executive and board-level positions with public and privately held companies, including Apple, Disney, and HSBC. As an investment banker, he advised at the board and C-level at Alibaba, Baidu, and other firms engaged in mergers and cross-border transactions. He was a founding investor in the Crystal Orange Hotel Group, helping grow the company to 130 properties and 1,500 employees in China. He also led successful investments in e-commerce, real estate, and medical technology companies.

Gibbs is currently an Executive in Residence with the China Business Studies Initiative at the University of San Francisco and a National Committee on US-China Relations member.

He has lived in Asia for over two decades and is a Mandarin speaker.

He holds a BA in economics from UCLA and an MBA from the Haas School of Business at UC Berkeley. He splits his time between San Francisco and Shanghai.



DORIS KEARNS GOODWIN

Pulitzer Prize-winning author Doris Kearns Goodwin is world-renowned as a presidential historian, author of eight critically acclaimed and New York Times bestselling books, and partner in Pastimes Productions Inc., an independent production company.

Her newest book, An Unfinished Love Story: A Personal History of the 1960s, artfully weaves together biography, memoir, and history. Her award-winning book *Team of Rivals: The Political* Genius of Abraham Lincoln inspired Steven Spielberg's film Lincoln, which earned 12 Academy Award® nominations. Team of Rivals was awarded the prestigious Lincoln Prize, the inaugural Book Prize for American History, and in 2016, Goodwin was the first historian to receive the Lincoln Leadership Prize from the Abraham Lincoln Presidential Library Foundation.

Goodwin won the Pulitzer Prize in History for *No Ordinary* Time: Franklin and Eleanor Roosevelt: The Home Front in World War II. Her book, The Fitzgeralds and the Kennedys, was adapted into an award-winning television miniseries.

Goodwin's other acclaimed books include The Bully Pulpit: Theodore Roosevelt, William Howard Taft, and the Golden Age of Journalism, which won the Carnegie Medal and is in part the basis for a film about Ida Tarbell, the famous muckraking journalist of the era.

Since 2020, Goodwin has executive produced three miniseries for the History Channel: WASHINGTON, ABRAHAM LINCOLN, and THEODORE ROOSEVELT. She has also served as a consultant and has been extensively interviewed for PBS and History's documentaries on Presidents Johnson, Roosevelt, and Lincoln, the Kennedy family, and Ken Burns' The History of Baseball and The Roosevelts: An Intimate History.

Goodwin graduated magna cum laude from Colby College. She earned a Ph.D. in government from Harvard, where she taught government, including a course on the American Presidency.



DAVID GRANN

David Grann is a #1 *New York Times* bestselling author and an award-winning staff writer at *The New Yorker*.

His latest tour-de-force bestseller, *The Wager*, tells the harrowing saga of a shipwrecked British warship crew initially hailed as heroes but later accused of mutiny.

His epic nonfiction crime opus, *Killers of the Flower Moon*, was a finalist for the National Book Award and a winner of the Edgar Allen Poe Award for best true crime book. It was a #1 *New York Times* bestseller and named one of the year's best books by the *Times, Wall Street Journal, Washington Post, Los Angeles Times, Entertainment Weekly, Time*, and other publications. Amazon selected it as the single best book of the year. The film adaptation of *Killers of the Flower Moon* was directed by Martin Scorsese and was nominated for an Academy Award for Best Picture. Scorsese and actor Leonardo DiCaprio are already busy adapting *The Wager* for the big screen.

Grann's first book, *The Lost City of Z: A Tale of Deadly Obsession in the Amazon*, was the #1 *New York Times* bestseller and shortlisted for the Samuel Johnson Prize. It was adapted into a critically acclaimed film directed by James Gray and starring Charlie Hunnam, Sienna Miller, Robert Pattinson, and Tom Holland.

Over the years, Grann's stories have been published in The New York Times Magazine, The Atlantic, The Washington Post, The Boston Globe, and The Wall Street Journal.

Grann holds master's degrees in international relations (from the Fletcher School of Law and Diplomacy) and creative writing (from Boston University). After graduating from Connecticut College in 1989, he received a Thomas J. Watson Fellowship and did research in Mexico, where he began his career in journalism.



JEANNE WALKER HARVEY

Jeanne Walker Harvey is an award-winning children's book author of picture book biographies: *Ablaze with Color: A Story of Painter Alma Thomas* (winner of the 2022 Northern California Book Awards – Children's Literature Younger Readers, NAACP Image Award Nominee, Jane Addams Children's Book Award finalist), *Else B. in the Sea: The Woman Who Painted the Wonders of the Deep, Dressing Up The Stars: The Story of Movie Costume Designer Edith Head, Maya Lin: Artist-Architect of Light and Lines, My Hands Sing the Blues: Romare Bearden's Childhood Journey*, and *The Glass Pyramid: The Louvre Museum and Architect I.M Pei* (Summer 2025).

Harvey has also written two popular picture books about marine mammal rescue stories, *Astro the Stellar Sea Lion* and *Honey Girl The Hawaiian Monk Seal*, and also the iconic San Francisco Bay-inspired picture book *Boats on the Bay.*

A graduate with distinction of Stanford University and UC Davis King Hall School of Law, Harvey has worn many job hats, ranging from roller coaster operator to long-time docent at the San Francisco Museum of Modern Art.



ANITA GAIL JONES

Anita Gail Jones is a multi-talented visual artist, professional storyteller, and writer who has made a name for herself with her debut novel, *The Peach Seed*. In 2021, the book was named a top-ten finalist for the PEN/Bellwether Prize for Socially Engaged Fiction, solidifying Jones's status as a rising star in the literary world.

Jones is a master storyteller, having spent many years as an artist-in-residence in San Francisco Bay Area schools. During this time, she combined oral histories, visual arts, and writing in K-12 workshops, honing her craft and perfecting her unique voice. Her experience and dedication paid off when an earlier version of *The Peach Seed* was named a Novella Semi-Finalist in the William Faulkner-William Wisdom Creative Writing Competition.

The Peach Seed has garnered much acclaim, including being featured among *Essence Magazine*'s "15 New Books We Can't Wait To Read This Summer," *Elle* magazine's "Books We're Most Eager to Read for 2023," and the "2024 Books All Georgians Should Read List" by Georgia Center for the Book.

In addition to her work as a novelist, Jones has contributed to the anthology *Gardening Among Friends: Practical Essays by Master Gardeners* and has published gardening articles for *The Marin Independent Journal* and *The Women's Eye* online magazine.

Jones has a fine arts degree from Guilford College in Greensboro, NC. She is a Hedgebrook Women Writersin-Residence alumna and a 2018-2019 Affiliate Artist at the Headlands Center for the Arts, where she continues to inspire and motivate fellow writers.

Born and raised in Albany, Georgia, Jones draws on her personal experiences and deep cultural roots to create stories that resonate with readers worldwide.



QUINTON MARTINS

Quinton Martins, Ph.D., is the Founding Partner of the African safari company True Wild and the Principal Investigator of Living with Lions, a community conservation project centered around the mountain lion population in the San Francisco North Bay.

Martins is the former founder and CEO of the Cape Leopard Trust, a successful predator conservation NGO based in South Africa. He has 30 years of field experience working in wilderness areas throughout much of Africa, Saudi Arabia and the USA.

From specialist safari guiding, leading a scorpion collecting expedition for the Smithsonian Institution in the desert of Namibia, to mist-netting birds in central African rainforests, Martins has been studying predators since 2003.

Martins completed his Ph.D. "The Ecology of Leopards in the Cederberg Mountains, South Africa" through the University of Bristol, U.K. in 2010 and is considered a leading expert on large wild cats.



LUIS MIRANDA JR.

Luis Miranda Jr. is more than just the father of *Hamilton* playwright Lin-Manuel Miranda. He is a remarkable Latino, New Yorker, and national political figure.

In the 1980s, Miranda was Mayor Ed Koch's special advisor for Hispanic Affairs, and he continued to serve in key roles for the Dinkins and Giuliani administrations. His upcoming memoir, *Relentless: My Story of the Latino Spirit That Is Transforming America*, tells the moving story of his life and career.

As a founding partner of the MirRam Group, Miranda has consulted on several successful political campaigns, including those of Secretary Hillary Rodham Clinton, Senator Chuck Schumer, and Senator Kirsten Gillibrand. Most recently, he managed New York Attorney General Letitia James' successful reelection.

Miranda was the founding President of the Hispanic Federation, one of the leading Latino nonprofit organizations that addresses the Hispanic community's human services and health needs.

In 2020, his documentary *Siempre, Luis* premiered on HBO Max. The film follows Miranda's life as a longtime fighter for the Latinx communities, showing his journey to the halls of government as a powerful lobbyist in NYC and later as a leader in relief efforts following Hurricanes Irma and Maria in Puerto Rico.

Under Miranda's stewardship, his family has dramatically expanded their philanthropic endeavors since *Hamilton*'s critical and commercial success, focusing on increasing people of color's representation throughout the arts and government, ensuring access to women's reproductive health, and preserving and strengthening the arts in Puerto Rico.

Miranda was born and raised in Puerto Rico. He moved to New York City after earning his B.A. from the University of Puerto Rico.



AZA RASKIN

Aza Raskin is a National Geographic Explorer and cofounder of Earth Species Project, an international nonprofit dedicated to using AI to decode animal communication and transform how humans relate to the rest of nature. He is also the co-founder of the Center for Humane Technology, working to align technology with humanity's best interests.

Raskin was the subject of the documentary *The Social Dilemma* and is the co-host for the popular podcast *Your Undivided Attention*.

Trained as a mathematician and dark matter physicist, Raskin has taken three companies from founding to acquisition, has been a co-chairing member of the World Economic Forum's Global Future Council on the Future of Al, briefs heads of state, and helped found Mozilla Labs, in addition to being named *FastCompany*'s Master of Design, and listed on *Forbes* and *Inc. Magazine*'s 30-under-30.

Raskin has done dark matter research at Tokyo University and the University of Chicago, where he graduated with a B.S. in math and physics.



JEFFREY ROSEN

The *Chicago Tribune* named Jeffrey Rosen one of the ten best magazine journalists in America, and the *Los Angeles Times* called him the nation's most widely-read and influential legal commentator. Rosen's new book, *The Pursuit of Happiness: How Classical Writers on Virtue Inspired the Lives of the Founders and Defined America*, is a revelatory journey into the minds of the Founders, providing a deep, rich, and fresh understanding of the foundation of our democracy.

Rosen is the President and CEO of the non-partisan National Constitution Center, where he hosts *We the People*, a weekly podcast of constitutional debate. He is also a professor of law at the George Washington University Law School and a contributing editor of *The Atlantic*. He was previously the legal affairs editor of *The New Republic* and a staff writer for *The New Yorker*.

His other books include the *New York Times* bestseller *Conversations with RBG: Justice Ruth Bader Ginsburg on Life, Love, Liberty, and Law, The Supreme Court: The Personalities and Rivalries that Defined America,* and The Naked Crowd: *Reclaiming Security and Freedom in an Anxious Age.* He has also written acclaimed biographies of Louis Brandeis and William Howard Taft.

Rosen received the Association of American Publisher's Award for Distinguished Public Service in 2020, with AAP citing his exceptional work as a constitutional scholar, author, and educator.

Rosen graduated from Harvard College, Oxford University, where he was a Marshall Scholar, and Yale Law School.



KORI SCHAKE

Kori Schake, a Sonoma native and U.S. foreign policy expert, has held prominent policy positions across government, academia, and think tanks, including working with both the military and civilian staffs of the Pentagon, in the White House at the National Security Council, and at the US State Department as Deputy Head of Policy Planning. During the 2008 election cycle, she was Senior Policy Advisor on John McCain's presidential campaign. She currently leads the foreign and defense policy team at the American Enterprise Institute.

Schake has authored five books, including Safe Passage: The Transition from British to American Hegemony, America vs the West: Can the Liberal World Order Be Preserved?, State of Disrepair: Fixing the Culture and Practices of the State Department, and Managing American Hegemony: Essays on Power in a Time of Dominance. She is also the coeditor, along with former Secretary of Defense Jim Mattis, of Warriors & Citizens: American Views of Our Military.

Schake has been widely published in policy journals and the popular press and profiled in publications ranging from national news to popular culture, including the *Los Angeles Times, Politico*, and *Vogue*. She is also a contributing writer at *The Atlantic* and *War on the Rocks*.

Schake has a Ph.D. and MA in government and politics from the University of Maryland, an MPM from the University of Maryland School of Public Policy, and a BA in international relations from Stanford University.



HAMPTON SIDES

Wade Hampton Sides is an American historian, author, and journalist. He is renowned for gripping stories depicting epic battles and exploration expeditions. Packed with drama and moral complexity, his books vividly examine the past and insightfully examine themes broadly relevant today.

Sides' new book, *The Wide Wide Sea*, was released on April 9. It is an epic account of the most momentous voyage of the Age of Exploration, culminating in Captain James Cook's death in Hawaii. This voyage left a complex and controversial legacy that is still debated today.

Sides' other best-selling histories include In the Kingdom of Ice, recounting the heroic polar voyage of the U.S.S. Jeannette during the Gilded Age; Ghost Soldiers about a daring rescue mission in WWII; On Desperate Ground, a harrowing accounting of the Korean War's greatest battle; and Blood and Thunder, a riveting narrative of the 20-year struggle for control of Navajo country. Blood and Thunder was named one of Time magazine's 10 Best Books of 2006 and is currently under development for the screen. His 2010 book, Hellhound On His Trail, about the international manhunt for MLK, Jr. assassin James Earl Ray, was the basis for the acclaimed PBS documentary Roads to Memphis, for which Sides served as historical consultant.

Sides is editor-at-large for *Outside* and a frequent contributor to *National Geographic* and other magazines. His journalistic work has been twice nominated for National Magazine Awards for feature writing. He is also a partner of Atalaya Productions, an independent film company that develops non-fiction and historical stories for the screen.

A native of Memphis, Sides graduated from Yale with a BA in history. A frequent lecturer, he divides his time between New Mexico and Colorado College, teaching narrative nonfiction and serving as a Journalist in Residence.



DEEPAK SRIVASTAVA, M.D.

Fresh off his 2023 Distinguished Scientist Award from the American Heart Association, Dr. Deepak Srivastava, President of the Gladstone Institutes, joins us in Sonoma to discuss how medicine will be almost unrecognizable 20 years from now and how that transformation is starting right now.

The Srivastava Lab is focused on the gene networks that guide the development of the heart, seeking to understand how aberrations in these pathways can cause congenital heart disease and how they can use this knowledge to generate new cardiac cells to repair heart damage.

Srivastava co-founded two biotech companies to bring fundamental new research discoveries to clinical trials. He is a member of the American Academy of Arts and Sciences and the National Academy of Medicine and a former president of the International Society for Stem Cell Research. For his outstanding research related to childhood disease, he received the E. Mead Johnson Award. His articles appear in *Cell, Nature, and Science*.

Srivastava received his BS from Rice University and MD from the University of Texas. He trained in pediatrics at UCSF and pediatric cardiology at the Children's Hospital of Harvard Medical School. Before joining Gladstone in 2005, he was a professor in the Departments of Pediatrics and Molecular Biology at the University of Texas Southwestern Medical Center in Dallas.



ADMIRAL JAMES STAVRIDIS

When NBC News needs a diplomacy and national security expert, they turn to retired four-star U.S. naval officer Admiral James Stavridis.

Admiral Stavridis led the NATO Alliance in global operations from 2009 to 2013, responsible for Afghanistan, Libya, the Balkans, Syria, counter-piracy, and cyber security. He also served as Commander of U.S. Southern Command from 2006 to 2009. Earlier in his military career, he commanded the top ship in the Atlantic Fleet, a squadron of destroyers, and a carrier strike group—all in combat. Over his 37-year military career, he earned over 50 medals, including 28 from foreign nations.

Stavridis graduated from the United States Naval Academy and later earned a Ph.D. and Master of Arts in Law and Diplomacy from The Fletcher School of Law and Diplomacy at Tufts University, where he won the Gullion Prize. He has published 12 books and thousands of articles in leading journals worldwide. He is a Bloomberg Opinion columnist and Chief International Security Analyst for NBC News. His 2012 TED Talk on global security has over one million views.

Stavridis and his co-author, Elliot Ackerman, have followed up their best-selling novel, 2034: The Next World War, with the March release of 2054. The new book is a thrilling glimpse into a not-so-distant future where technology and humanity collide in a high-stakes battle for control. The plot revolves around the concept of "singularity" —a hypothetical future where technology growth is boundless and irreversible.

Stavridis is currently a Partner and Vice Chair of global affairs at The Carlyle Group, a global investment firm. He is also Chair of the Rockefeller Foundation board. Previously, he served for five years as Dean of The Fletcher School at Tufts.



Since her first book, *The Joy Luck Club*, spent more than 40 weeks on the *New York Times* Bestseller List, Amy Tan has captivated readers with her novels, short stories, and memoirs and has been a favorite speaker on the SVAF stage.

With boundless charm and wit, Tan charts her foray into birding and the world's natural wonders in her gorgeous new book, *The Backyard Bird Chronicles*.

Tan's novels include The Joy Luck Club, The Kitchen God's Wife, The Hundred Secret Senses, The Bonesetter's Daughter, Saving Fish from Drowning, and The Valley of Amazement, all New York Times bestsellers. She is also the author of two children's books, The Moon Lady, and Sagwa: The Chinese Siamese Cat, which was adapted into a PBS production.

She has written a memoir, *The Opposite of Fate*, and a book about writing titled *Where the Past Begins: A Writer's Memoir*. She served as co-producer and co-screenwriter for *The Joy Luck Club*'s film adaptation and wrote the libretto for *The Bonesetter's Daughter*, which had its world premiere with the San Francisco Opera in 2008. She is also the subject of a 2021 documentary by James Redford titled *Amy Tan: Unintended Memoir*, which is now on Netflix.

Tan has been nominated for the National Book Award, the National Book Critics Circle Award, and the International Orange Prize. She serves on the board of the American Bird Conservancy.

Tan grew up in California and in Switzerland. She attended five colleges: Linfield College, San Jose City College, San Jose State University, University of California at Santa Cruz, and University of California at Berkeley. She received her B.A. with a double major in English and Linguistics, followed by her M.A. in Linguistics.



YNALDO RIVERA

COLM TÓIBÍN

Bestselling Irish author Colm Tóibín is considered one of the greatest European storytellers of his time. His hotly anticipated new novel, *Long Island*, is a sequel to his previous work, *Brooklyn*, which captivated readers worldwide. Set in the 1970s, the story follows the complex and compelling protagonist, Eilis Lacey, two decades after the first book's events.

Tóibín is the author of 11 critically acclaimed novels and has been shortlisted for the Booker Prize three times. His books include *The Magician*, winner of the Rathbones Folio Prize; *The Master*, winner of the *Los Angeles Times* Book Prize; *The Testament of Mary*; and *Nora Webster*. He has also written two story collections and several books of criticism. The Arts Council of Ireland named him the Laureate for Irish Fiction for 2022–2024.

The Testament of Mary was adapted for the stage and nominated for a Tony Award for Best Play. Brooklyn was adapted into an Oscar-nominated film. Tóibín was also a screenwriter for the feature film Return to Montauk.

In the summer of 2024, Tóibín will be awarded the 14th Würth Prize for European Literature "for his artful representation of people in his novels and stories, as well as for the lucid literary interpretations provided in his essays and lectures."

Tóibín graduated from University College Dublin. He has taught at Stanford, the University of Texas at Austin, Princeton, and the University of Manchester. He splits his time between Dublin and New York and is currently a professor at Columbia and Chancellor of Liverpool University.



ABOUT STUDENTS DAY Since the first year of the Festival, co-founders Ginny and David Freeman's vision has included introducing Sonoma Valley students to the power of the written word and the extraordinary impact of new ideas through engaging with today's top speakers and thought leaders. Horizons open, imaginations awaken, minds expand and dreams are born. That is the magic of the Sonoma Valley Authors Festival Students Day.

In a time when students' eyes are increasingly drawn toward screens for information and even affirmation, books open a reader's mind to a new world of possibility and provide a gateway to explore new ideas, cultures and experiences.

The first annual Students Day was held on May 4, 2018, when select authors and visionaries in science, technology and medicine spoke with 2,700 middle and high school students. Over 5,000 books written by the presenting authors were given free to the students, all paid for with private donations.

Since that day, the Sonoma Valley Authors Festival has hosted Students Day with approximately 3,000-4,000 books written by the presenting authors given away each year, for a total of 15,000 books to date, all paid for with private funds. The only exception was 2020, due to Covid.

This year, Students Day will be held on Friday, April 26. "Mathemagician" Arthur Benjamin, famed anthropologist Wade Davis, constitutional expert Jeffrey Rosen, astronomist Alex Filippenko, graphic designer Craig Frazier, story-teller Anita Gail Jones, and thought-leader Luis A. Miranda, Jr. will speak to students at Sonoma Valley High School. Children's book author Jeanne Walker Harvey will speak at three Sonoma Valley elementary schools.
