Welcome to the ninth annual Sonoma Valley Authors Festival! We are thrilled that you have chosen to spend the weekend with us as we engage with some of the world's most talented authors, speakers, and thought leaders. We have specially curated these three days to present a variety of literary genres and topics, from novels to poetry, history, geopolitical issues, and non-fiction to the latest advances in science, technology, and medicine. Our desire in establishing the Festival has been to bring a world-class literary event to the Sonoma wine country and celebrate learning and the art of thoughtful discussion in this beautiful setting.

Additionally, we want to share the Festival's programming with as much of our community as possible. To this end, we produce two community-focused events during the Festival. Students Day is a full day event on Friday, when we bring thought leaders to share their ideas with Sonoma Valley students and encourage them to explore new concepts, and find avenues for personal growth and pursuing their dreams. Students Day at the elementary schools takes place in the days leading up to the Festival and includes author presentations, and in 2026, the distribution of 2,000 free books to local students. Authors on the Plaza, held Saturday at the historic Sonoma Plaza, is a family-friendly free community event.

We are pleased to report that since our inception in 2018, almost 200 authors and thought leaders have presented to over 2,750 attendees. At Students Day, our speakers have touched 14,500 students, and almost 20,000 books written by the presenting authors have been given free to students. Authors on the Sonoma Plaza, our free event for the Sonoma Community, enjoyed 1,000 attendees in 2025. All this has been made possible thanks to the generosity of our sponsors.

THE FESTIVAL EXPERIENCE

WELCOME

The Sonoma Valley Authors Festival team and our wonderful volunteers are here to make your Festival experience enjoyable and memorable. If you have any questions, we're here to help! Below are some basic guidelines to ensure a good time is had by all.

HEALTH MEASURES

The safety of our attendees, speakers, staff, and volunteers is of utmost importance. We ask that you comply with any health mandates during the Festival and refrain from attending sessions if you have any flu or COVID-like symptoms. Guests may elect to wear masks if they feel more comfortable doing so. The buildings are well-ventilated, and the sessions are scheduled to allow attendees frequent opportunities to change their surroundings.

NAME BADGES

Access to all Festival venues is limited to those wearing name badges. Please wear your badge at all times.

INFORMATION

If you have questions, please visit the information desk located on the Breezeway Lawn. Also, look for one of our volunteers. They will be happy to help.

SEATING

We encourage Festival attendees to take their seats at least 5 minutes before the start of each presentation. Please note, reserved seating for specific passholders is marked on the chair band, where applicable.

LATE SEATING

We sympathize with latecomers, but for the sake of the speakers and other guests, we will not be able to seat you once a presentation has begun. Latecomers will be asked to stand in the back if there is room.

ACCESSIBILITY

Fairmont Sonoma Mission Inn and Spa can accommodate guests with mobility issues. Ask the Front Desk for assistance inside the hotel. There is also a SVAF golf cart located all day in the entrance roundabout. Ask for help moving between sessions, if needed.

Sonoma Valley, about an hour's drive north of San Francisco, delights visitors and residents alike with its stunning beauty, rich history, acclaimed food and wine, and numerous outdoor activities. Boasting over 13,000 acres of state and regional parks for hiking, biking and picnicking, and over 400 wineries as well as a new 2-star Michelin restaurant, Sonoma Valley welcomes you to discover its many attributes

Explore Sonoma's rich past and Old West culture around the historic tree-filled Sonoma Plaza. Founded in 1835 when California was still a part of Mexico, the town's heritage is still evident today. An 18th century Spanish mission stands across the street, open for visitors to relive its past.

A block away, the Sonoma Valley Art Museum exhibits renowned works by regional, national and international modern and contemporary artists. The Plaza is a historic landmark, a unique gem radiating a sense of tranquility around every corner, restaurant and shop. This is where small-town authenticity, old-world charm and cosmopolitan sophistication truly come together. RICK ATKINSON

The Fate of the Day: The War for America: Fort Ticonderoga to Charleston, 1777-1780

Many people think they know the American Revolution well, but Rick Atkinson challenges common myths. He avoids the extremes of hero-worship and cynicism, offering balanced portraits of the founders and a nuanced account of how close the cause of independence often came to failure. This kind of revision — grounded in evidence and empathy — may reshape how you understand the nation’s origins. Atkinson is a three-time Pulitzer Prize winner whose books bring to life not just famous figures like George Washington and Benedict Arnold, but also the experiences of ordinary soldiers, civilians, and even the British side of the war. Atkinson’s talks go beyond military history to explore broader themes—what leadership looks like in chaos, how fragile nations improvise their survival, and what the Revolution can still teach democratic societies today.

What You Need to Know About AI: A Primer on Being Human in an Artificially Intelligent World

Everyone is talking about AI, but very few people have a clear framework for thinking about it. She joined the CIA for the final 15 years of her career, but remained active for decades after her retirement, although her achievements were classified or overshadowed. Her story flips expectations: the most effective spy in the room was often the one no one took seriously.

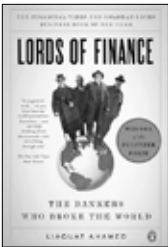
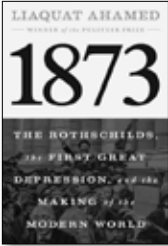

LIAQUAT AHAMED

Liaquat Ahamed spent more than two decades leading the World Bank's institutional investment division and later the BNP Paribas subsidiary Fischer Francis Trees & Watts. He is also a Pulitzer Prize–winning historian known for revealing how the personalities and beliefs of central bankers shape the course of global economic history.



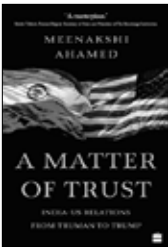
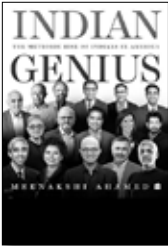
Ahamed is best known for his landmark study of central bankers and the Great Depression, *Lords of Finance: The Bankers Who Broke the World*. In addition to winning the 2010 Pulitzer Prize for History, his first book won the *Financial Times*–Goldman Sachs Business Book of the Year Award and the Council on Foreign Relations' Arthur Ross Gold Medal. Ahamed later published *Money and Tough Love: On Tour with the IMF*, a shorter work that illuminates the culture, constraints, and political dilemmas of the International Monetary Fund. Ahamed's new book, *1873: The Rothschilds, the First Great Depression and the Making of the Modern World*, revisits the first truly global financial crisis through the lens of the pioneering European banking dynasty at its center.

Ahamed holds degrees in economics from Cambridge University and Harvard. He has served on the board of trustees of the Brookings Institution, chairs the Sun Valley Writers' Conference, and has been involved with the New America Foundation. He was also one of the producers of the 2006 Iraq War film, *The Situation*.

He is a frequent contributor to *The New York Times*, the *Financial Times*, and *Foreign Affairs*.

**MEENAKSHI (MEENA) AHAMED**

Meenakshi Ahamed is a journalist and author whose work bridges South Asia and the United States, offering a deeply informed perspective on diplomacy, migration, and the forces reshaping global politics. She is the author of *Indian Genius: The Meteoric Rise of Indians in America*, which explores how Indian Americans have become leaders in technology, medicine, business, and public life, as well as the social and cultural factors behind their striking success. Her earlier book, *A Matter of Trust: U.S.–India Relations from Truman to Trump*, is a detailed narrative history of the complex and evolving partnership between the world’s largest and oldest democracies.



Ahamed began her career at the World Bank and later served as the London correspondent for New Delhi Television (NDTV) from 1989 to 1996. Her work has since appeared in publications including *The New York Times*, *The Washington Post*, *The Atlantic*, *Foreign Policy*, *The Wall Street Journal*, and *The Asian Age*.

In addition to her writing, Ahamed has long been active in global health and humanitarian work. She has served on the boards of Doctors Without Borders, Drugs for Neglected Diseases, the Turquoise Mountain Foundation, and the Vellore Christian Medical College Foundation.

Born in Calcutta, India, Ahamed earned her master’s degree in development economics and public health from the Johns Hopkins School of Advanced International Studies (SAIS).

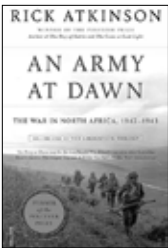
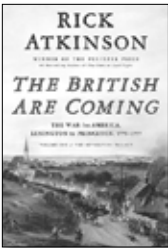
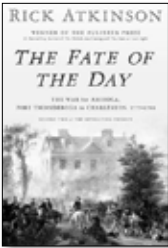
Rick Atkinson is the author of eight seminal narrative histories about five American wars, and *The New York Times Book Review* declared, “There is no better writer of narrative history than the Pulitzer Prize-winning Atkinson.”

Atkinson is best known for his *Liberation Trilogy*, the definitive account of America’s role in the liberation of Europe during World War II. His sweeping *Revolution Trilogy*—written in conjunction with his contributions to Ken Burns’s multi-part series on the American Revolutionary War—offers a masterful retelling of America’s fight for independence. Together, these works illuminate some of the most consequential moments in the nation’s past with unparalleled clarity and humanity.

His most recent book, *The Fate of the Day: The War for America, Fort Ticonderoga to Charleston, 1777-1780*, debuted as the #1 *New York Times* nonfiction bestseller.

Atkinson is a three-time Pulitzer Prize recipient: the 1982 Pulitzer Prize for National Reporting, the 1999 Pulitzer Prize for Public Service (as part of The Washington Post staff), and the 2003 Pulitzer Prize in History for *An Army at Dawn*.

Holding a bachelor’s degree from East Carolina University and a master’s in English literature from the University of Chicago, Atkinson began as a newspaper reporter in Kansas and later worked for *The Kansas City Times* and *The Washington Post*, where he won multiple awards for his coverage. He later served as *The Washington Post*’s bureau chief in Berlin and covered significant conflicts such as the Persian Gulf War and the Iraq invasion.



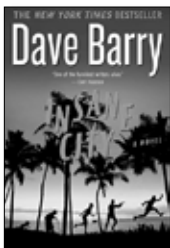
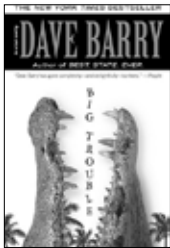
**DAVE BARRY**

Dave Barry began his journalism career at the *Daily Local News* in Pennsylvania, where he developed his distinctive comedic style as a local reporter and editor. He subsequently gained fame for his nationally syndicated *Miami Herald* column, which ran from 1983 to 2005 and appeared in more than 500 newspapers across the U.S. and internationally. He catapulted to national stardom when he won the Pulitzer Prize for Commentary while at the *Miami Herald*, becoming one of the rare humorists to receive journalism's highest honor. The Pulitzer committee praised him for using humor to offer fresh insights into serious topics.

Beyond his newspaper columns, Barry is renowned for dozens of best-selling books, including fiction, essay collections, children's novels, and satirical nonfiction. Some of his notable titles include *Dave Barry Turns 40*, *Dave Barry Is Not Taking This Sitting Down*, and *Lessons From Lucy: The Simple Joys of an Old, Happy Dog*.

Along with Ridley Pearson, Barry co-wrote the *Peter and the Starcatchers* young-adult series, one of which was adapted into the Tony Award–winning Broadway play *Peter and the Starcatcher*. His work also inspired the CBS sitcom *Dave's World*, and his role in popularizing International Talk Like a Pirate Day has left a quirky mark on American humor.

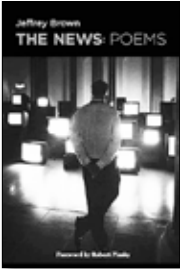

JEFFREY BROWN

Jeffrey Brown is Senior Correspondent and Chief Arts Correspondent for PBS *NewsHour*, public television’s prestigious nightly news program viewed by millions. During his 30-year career with the *NewsHour*, he has served as co-anchor, studio moderator, and field reporter on a wide range of national and international issues.



Brown has interviewed numerous leading American and international newsmakers, moderated studio discussions on a vast array of topics, and reported from across the United States and other regions of the globe. As an arts correspondent, he has profiled many of the world’s leading writers, musicians, and other artists. As senior national affairs producer for over a decade, he helped shape the program’s coverage of the economy, healthcare, social policy, culture, and other areas. In addition, he leads *NewsHour*’s extensive coverage of arts and culture, called “Canvas.” He also hosts the monthly book club, “Now Read This,” a collaboration with *The New York Times*. His work as correspondent and producer has garnered the Peabody Award, a News & Documentary Emmy Award, and several Cine Golden Eagle Awards.

His acclaimed book of prose and poetry, *The News*, explores the intersections between politics and poetry. His poetry has been selected for inclusion in the Academy of American Poets’ *365 Poems* anthology.

Before joining the *NewsHour*, Brown produced numerous public television series for Media & Society Seminars, an independent production company headed by Fred W. Friendly.

He attended UC Berkeley, Berkeley School of Law, and Columbia’s Graduate School of Journalism.



BRYAN BURROUGH

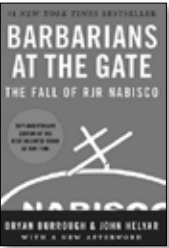

Burrough began his career at *The Wall Street Journal*, where he earned critical acclaim, winning the prestigious Gerald Loeb Award for financial journalism three times.

Burrough has authored or co-authored eight books, including four *New York Times* bestsellers: *Public Enemies*, which chronicles America’s crime wave and the birth of the FBI; *The Big Rich*, which explores Texas oil dynasties; and *Forget the Alamo*, which challenges historical myths.

His latest book, *The Gunfighters: How Texas Made the West Wild*, offers a sweeping, deeply researched history of how Texas’s culture of violence and mythmaking shaped the lawlessness and legends of the American West.

Burrough has been a correspondent for *Vanity Fair* since 1992 and is a longtime Editor at Large at *Texas Monthly*. He earned a B.A. in journalism from the University of Missouri School of Journalism.

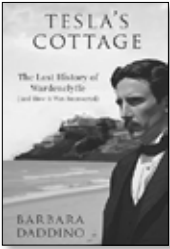
After serving as the U.S. Poet Laureate from 2001 to 2003, he served as New York State Poet Laureate from 2004 to 2006.

Daddino holds an MFA in creative writing from New York University. Her essays and movie reviews have appeared in *Newsday* and on PBS. She has also taught English and creative writing at Commack Public Schools and creative writing at NYU as an adjunct professor.



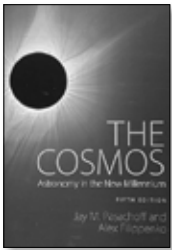
ALEX FILIPPENKO

Renowned UC Berkeley astronomy researcher and professor Alex Filippenko is one of the world’s most cited and accomplished astrophysicists and the only person to have been a member of both teams that revealed the accelerating expansion of the universe, a discovery that was honored with the 2011 Nobel Prize in Physics to the teams’ leaders.

His pioneering research has profoundly shaped modern understanding of supernovae, black holes, and the accelerating expansion of the universe. He has been on the U.C. Berkeley faculty since 1986 and has been voted the “Best Professor” on campus a record nine times.

Filippenko received a B.A. in physics from UC Santa Barbara and a Ph.D. in astronomy from Caltech.

A prolific scholar, Filippenko has authored or coauthored more than 1,200 scientific papers, making him one of the world’s most highly cited astronomers. His many honors include the Gruber Prize in Cosmology, Breakthrough Prize in Fundamental Physics, and the Carnegie/CASE U.S. National Professor of the Year award. His research focuses on supernovae and active galaxies at optical, ultraviolet, and near-infrared wavelengths, as well as on black holes, gamma-ray bursts, and the expansion of the Universe.

DR. STEVE FINKBEINER

Dr. Steve Finkbeiner is a renowned neuroscientist and physician, recognized for his pioneering work on neurodegenerative diseases such as Alzheimer's, Parkinson's, and ALS. His work sits at the intersection of science, technology, and medicine. His insight into the urgent search for cures to devastating neurological diseases makes him both inspiring and deeply relevant to audiences interested in science, technology, or the future of medicine.

Dr. Finkbeiner serves as the Director of the Center for Systems and Therapeutics and the Taube/Koret Center for Neurodegenerative Disease Research at the Gladstone Institutes, as well as a Professor of Neurology and Physiology at UCSF. His lab's integration of neuroscience, engineering, and computational biology places him at the forefront of modern brain research.

His research has revolutionized how scientists study brain cell function and failure. He has developed innovative imaging techniques that allow long-term observation of living neurons—especially his automated microscope system (“the robotic microscope”), which can track individual cells over time. This technology has led to crucial discoveries about how protein misfolding, cellular stress, and genetic mutations contribute to neuron death in degenerative diseases.

Dr. Finkbeiner earned his MD and PhD in Medicine and Neuroscience from Yale University, where he trained at the intersection of clinical medicine and molecular neuroscience. He then completed neurology residency training at UCSF, where he has remained an influential researcher and faculty member.

CRAIG FRAZIER

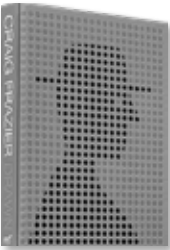


Craig Frazier has been illustrating the stories and communication of American businesses for more than 25 years. His illustration style is among the most distinctive and recognized in the country, characterized by humor, irony, and simplicity.

Frazier is an award-winning graphic designer whose illustrations have been featured in *The New York Times*, *Time* magazine, and *The Wall Street Journal*. He has designed eight popular stamps for the U.S. Postal Service and has written and illustrated almost a dozen children’s books.



His series of picture books about Stanley, a character who sees things differently, includes *Stanley Mows the Lawn*, which earned him the Society of Illustrators Silver Medal. Frazier’s new monograph, *Drawn*, was released in early 2024. A compendium of illustration and design spanning 45 years, the book features more than 400 illustrations and sketches curated from his long and illustrious career.



Frazier has received numerous awards from *Communication Arts*, The New York Art Director’s Club, *Print* magazine, Society of Illustrators, American Illustration, and *Graphis*. Frazier was published as one of the top 100 illustrators in 100 Illustrators in 2013 and was also featured three times in *Graphis* magazine in 2003, 2004, and 2018.



Frazier is a founding member of the San Francisco Chapter of the AIGA, and he is a frequent lecturer at universities and design conferences.

SVAF purchased Frazier’s illustration of the bird man for its logo back in 2017. The festival has been blessed to have limited use of dozens of his illustrations in its marketing materials ever since, creating the “signature look” of the Sonoma Valley Authors Festival, for which the Freemans are ever grateful. In addition, Frazier has taught short seminars at Sonoma Valley High School during the Festival for several years.



LIZA GERSHMAN

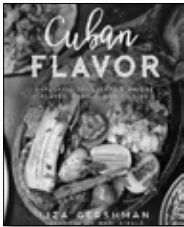

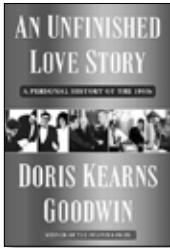

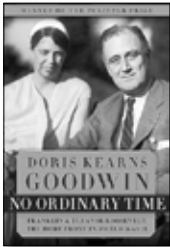


DORIS KEARNS GOODWIN

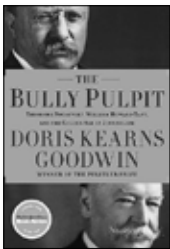
Doris Kearns Goodwin is a world-renowned presidential historian, public speaker, and Pulitzer Prize-winning, *New York Times* #1 best-selling author. She is celebrating the success of her eighth book, the stirring memoir, *An Unfinished Love Story: A Personal History of the 1960s*, now in paperback.



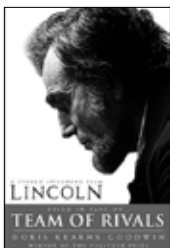
Goodwin's remarkable career began when, as a 24-year-old Harvard graduate student, she was selected to join the White House Fellows, one of America's most prestigious programs for leadership and public service. Goodwin worked with Lyndon Johnson in the White House and later assisted him in the writing of his memoirs.



That experience sparked her first major work, *Lyndon Johnson and the American Dream*, which became a national bestseller and earned widespread critical acclaim. In 2019, the book was re-released with a new foreword highlighting LBJ's enduring domestic achievements.



Goodwin was awarded the Pulitzer Prize for *No Ordinary Time: Franklin and Eleanor Roosevelt: The Home Front in World War II. The Fitzgeralds and the Kennedys* was adapted into an award-winning five-part television miniseries. Her sixth book, *The Bully Pulpit: Theodore Roosevelt, William Howard Taft, and the Golden Age of Journalism*, won the Carnegie Medal and is being developed into a film. Goodwin's *Team of Rivals: The Political Genius of Abraham Lincoln* served as the basis for Steven Spielberg's hit film *Lincoln* and was awarded the prestigious Lincoln Prize, the inaugural Book Prize for American History, and the Lincoln Leadership Prize.



Well known for her appearances and commentary on television, Goodwin is a trusted voice in documentaries, including Ken Burns' *The History of Baseball* and *The Roosevelts: An Intimate History*; and on news and cable networks, and shows including *Meet The Press* and *The Late Show with Stephen Colbert*.



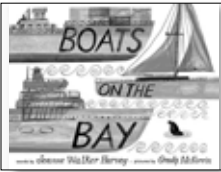
JEANNE WALKER HARVEY

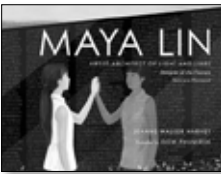
Her latest, *The Glass Pyramid: The Louvre Museum and Architect I.M Pei*, was published in mid-2025

JOHN HONCHARIW

John Honchariw has built his career on a simple but powerful idea: that animals are constantly talking to us — we just need better tools to listen.

As head of Companion, an AI-driven pet care company, Honchariw’s mission centers on using AI and machine learning to deepen understanding of pets, leveraging advanced cameras and intelligent software to process behavioral signals and movement data that are often invisible to the human eye.



It can detect health problems before owners even notice. Skeletal analysis can reveal potential pain or the onset of osteoarthritis, and candid footage can capture slow-moving changes in patterns that vets can use to diagnose conditions earlier.

His technology is designed to enhance — not replace — veterinary judgment, giving clinicians new tools to make faster, better-informed decisions.

Honchariw started his career at Bain & Company, then held product and business development roles at Amprius, AppDirect, and Google’s early-stage technology units.

Honchariw holds a BS in Mechanical & Aerospace Engineering and an ME in Systems Engineering from Cornell University.



SHALIE JONKER

Former technology executive Shalie Jonker pivoted from a successful career in Silicon Valley to co-found and co-own Noble Goat Farm, a thriving, no-till, no-spray working produce farm located at the base of Dry Creek Valley in Healdsburg.



Jonker exemplifies a new generation of purpose-driven farmers, using innovation and business expertise to support community-driven farming and strengthen local food systems. Jonker also serves as Board Chair of the Healdsburg Certified Farmers' Market, guiding its growth and expanding its community partnerships. Under her leadership, HCFM is also working on a major new transition - relocating into the newly remodeled Foley Family Community Pavilion.

Prior to farming, Jonker held leadership roles at Google and Box. At Google, she played an integral role in the explosive growth of Google Maps, overseeing marketing, customer experience, online growth, and business analytics. 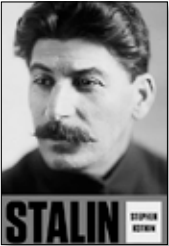
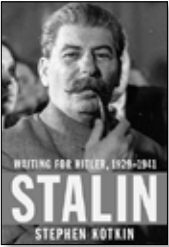

STEPHEN KOTKIN



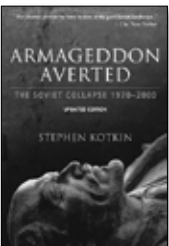
For more than 30 years, Stephen Kotkin has mentored new generations of Russian history scholars at Princeton University, and his research and writing have completely reshaped our understanding of Stalin, the Soviet Union, and 20th-century history.

As a leading authority on geopolitics and global history, his acclaimed works include *Magnetic Mountain: Stalinism as a Civilization*, *Armageddon Averted: The Soviet Collapse, 1970–2000*, and the ongoing three-volume Stalin biography—*Stalin: Paradoxes of Power, 1878–1928* and *Stalin: Waiting for Hitler, 1929–1941* — recognized as landmark contributions to modern historical scholarship. In mid-2026, the eagerly awaited final book in his planned trilogy, covering 1942–1953, will be released.



Kotkin is the Kleinheinz Senior Fellow at the Hoover Institution and a senior fellow at the Freeman Spogli Institute for International Studies at Stanford University. A Guggenheim, NEH, and ACLS fellow, Kotkin also writes frequently for *Foreign Affairs*, *The Wall Street Journal*, and the *Times Literary Supplement*, and advises institutions on authoritarian politics and global risk.

He earned his B.A. from the University of Rochester and his M.A. and Ph.D. in history from the University of California, Berkeley.



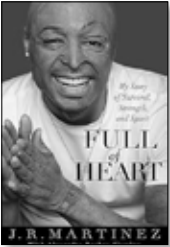
**SOYOUNG LEE**

Soyoung Lee is a Korean-born art historian, curator, and museum leader who serves as the Barbara Bass Bakar Director and CEO of the Asian Art Museum of San Francisco, one of the largest and most significant institutions dedicated to Asian and Asian American art in the United States. Lee began her tenure in April 2025, succeeding longtime director Jay Xu, and became the museum's first woman and first Korean-born leader in that role.



Lee began her curatorial career at The Metropolitan Museum of Art, where she joined in 2003 as the museum's first curator of Korean art. Over 15 years, she significantly expanded the Met's Korean art collection and produced acclaimed exhibitions, such as *Silla: Korea's Golden Kingdom* (2013) and *Diamond Mountains: Travel and Nostalgia in Korean Art* (2018). In 2018, she was named Chief Curator at the Harvard Art Museums, where she led major exhibitions and the museum's influential training program for emerging curators.

Born in Jakarta, Indonesia, to a South Korean diplomat, Lee spent her early years living internationally before settling in the United States as a teenager. She earned her B.A., M.A., and Ph.D. in art history from Columbia University, specializing in Korean and East Asian art.

J.R. MARTINEZ

J.R. Martinez is a burn survivor, Army Veteran, actor, *New York Times* best-selling author, motivational speaker, and advocate. He's a keynote speaker at major events, traveling the world to spread his message of resilience and optimism.

Martinez was born in Shreveport, Louisiana. His mother was an immigrant from El Salvador, and his two sisters were raised there. At age 9, he and his mother moved to Hope, Arkansas, where he was a high school football star.

He joined the U.S. Army after high school and underwent Basic and Advanced Training at Fort Benning, Georgia. In 2003, he was on a routine patrol when his Humvee hit a roadside bomb. In the years following, Martinez had over 34 surgeries, including multiple skin grafts and cosmetic surgeries.

During his recovery, a nurse asked him to speak to a burn patient in the hospital who had just seen his body for the first time. He discovered he found solace in helping other wounded survivors, and that inspiration is often a two-way street.

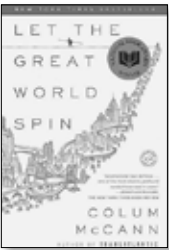
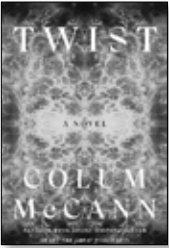

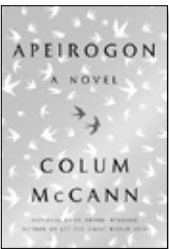
COLUM MCCANN

Irish author Colum McCann has created some of the defining works of contemporary fiction. His landmark novel *Let the Great World Spin*, inspired by Philippe Petit’s breathtaking tightrope walk between the Twin Towers, became a global phenomenon and earned the National Book Award.

Across 13 books translated into more than 40 languages, McCann has received some of the world’s most prestigious honors, including the International Dublin Literary Prize, France’s Chevalier des Arts et Lettres, the National Jewish Book Award, and even an Academy Award. His novel *Apeirogon*, a searing and humane exploration of the Israeli-Palestinian conflict, was longlisted for the Booker Prize. His electrifying new novel, *Twist*, brings the underwater world of free diving to vivid life.



McCann studied journalism at the Dublin Institute of Technology and earned his B.S. from the University of Texas at Austin. Early in his career, he worked as a reporter for several Irish newspapers, including *The Irish Press*, where he was named Young Journalist of the Year. He has since taught creative writing at Hunter College in New York.



He is also the cofounder of Narrative 4, an international nonprofit dedicated to building empathy through the exchange of personal stories—reflecting his enduring belief in storytelling as a force for connection and understanding.

Born and raised in Dublin, McCann now lives in New York City.





ABBAS MILANI

As the director of Iranian Studies at Stanford University, Abbas Milani possesses unparalleled expertise in U.S.-Iran relations and in Iranian cultural, political, and security issues.

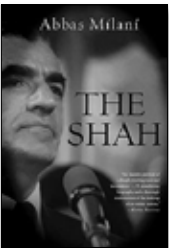
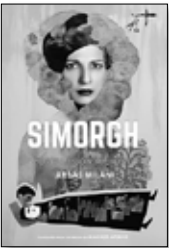
Milani gained widespread international recognition following the publication of his book, *The Shah*, in 2011, which received universal acclaim. Reviewers praised its depth of scholarship and Milani's impartiality in addressing such a controversial topic, with David C. Acheson of the *Washington Times* describing it as "impressive" in its research and analysis and Acheson stating that *The Shah* is "likely to be the definitive biography of its subject."

His new book, *Simorgh: Portraits on My Mind*, is an entralling look at some of Iran's most renowned writers, politicians, scholars, and activists - contemporaries of Milani and their struggles amidst the saga of the rise of the Islamic regime in Iran.

Milani joined Stanford in 2003 and became the founding director of the Iranian Studies Program in 2005. He also worked with two colleagues to launch the Iran Democracy Project at the Hoover Institution, where he is a research fellow and co-director.

Previously, Milani was a research fellow at the Iranian Center for Social Research and an assistant professor at the National University of Iran. He taught at Tehran University's Faculty of Law and Political Science, where he also served on the Board of Directors of the university's Center for International Relations.

Milani served for 14 years as Chair of the Political Science Department at Notre Dame de Namur University. He was a Research Fellow at the U.C. Berkeley's Middle East Center for eight years.

Katherine Snowden Pollard is Director of the Gladstone Institute of Data Science and Biotechnology and a professor in the Department of Epidemiology & Biostatistics at UCSF.

The Pollard lab at Gladstone Institutes develops computer models that enable them to decode how genomes work, evolve and break in disease. Their analyses of massive datasets predicted new causes for human genetic diseases and revealed the parts of the human genome that make us different from chimpanzees and other species. The team's open-source software fuels discoveries in labs and classrooms worldwide. Pollard's current focus is on accelerating biomedical research through building platforms that combine AI modeling with genome editing to establish cause and effect in human cells in the lab.

Pollard earned her B.A. in anthropology and mathematics from Pomona College in 1995. She went on to complete an M.S. and Ph.D. in Biostatistics at UC Berkeley in 2003.

Pollard is an elected member of the National Academy of Medicine, an American Association for the Advancement of Science (AAAS) Fellow, and she serves as a Chan Zuckerberg Biohub Investigator.

Todd S. Purdum is an accomplished journalist, author, and biographer whose career spans decades of incisive political and cultural reporting. Purdum has served as a national correspondent and White House reporter for *The New York Times*, a senior writer at *Vanity Fair*, and a staff writer at *The Atlantic*. His writing is marked by wit, empathy, and a deep curiosity about the forces that shape American life.

His new book, *Desi Arnaz: The Man Who Invented Television*, reclaims Arnaz’s reputation as not just Lucille Ball’s husband or TV co-star, but as one of the most innovative producers and entrepreneurs in television history. *Publishers Weekly* called it a “vividly rendered tale of a TV tycoon’s spectacular rise and ignominious fall.”

Purdum is the author of several acclaimed works of nonfiction. 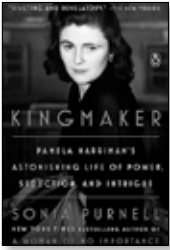

SONIA PURNELL

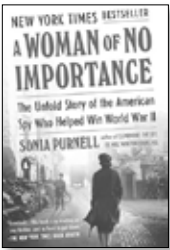

A graduate of Sussex University, Purnell began her career in journalism as a correspondent at the *Daily Telegraph* and as an editor at the *Daily Mail*.

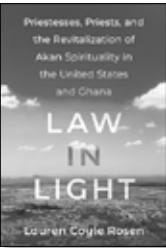


LAUREN COYLE ROSEN

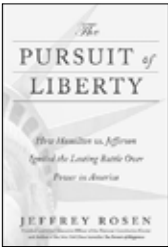

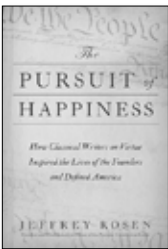


JEFFREY ROSEN

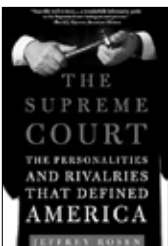
Rosen's previous *New York Times* bestseller, *The Pursuit of Happiness*, examines how that famous phrase defined the lives of our nation's Founders and became a linchpin of our democracy. His other acclaimed works include *The Most Democratic Branch*, *The Supreme Court: The Personalities and Rivalries That Defined America*, and *Louis D. Brandeis: American Prophet*.



Rosen is the former president of the National Constitution Center and currently serves as the legal affairs editor of *The New Republic* and a contributing editor for *The Atlantic*. He previously hosted *We the People*, featuring conversations with leading figures across the political spectrum, and his commentary appears regularly in *The New York Times*, *The Washington Post*, and *The Wall Street Journal*.



A graduate of Harvard College, Oxford University (where he was a Marshall Scholar), and Yale Law School, Rosen brings exceptional credentials to his multifaceted career. He serves as a professor at George Washington University Law School, where his courses on constitutional law have influenced countless future legal professionals.

MARIA SEMPLE

Celebrated novelist Maria Semple’s sharp wit and insight have made her a standout voice in contemporary fiction.

Semple launched her career as a television writer, contributing to iconic series like *Beverly Hills, 90210*, *Mad About You*, *Saturday Night Live*, *Ellen*, and *Arrested Development*. Her talents as a screenwriter have garnered her both Emmy and Writers Guild Award nominations.

The release of the novel *This One Is Mine* in 2008 marked Semple’s transition to fiction, followed by the blockbuster bestselling *Where’d You Go, Bernadette*, a quirky, bittersweet novel inspired by her own move to Seattle. *Bernadette* captured critical acclaim and was adapted into a major motion picture, directed by Richard Linklater and starring Cate Blanchett. The novel won the American Library Association’s Alex Award and was shortlisted for the Women’s Prize for Fiction. Semple’s third novel, *Today Will Be Different*, again showcased her genius for weaving humor and empathy into stories about flawed, unforgettable women. Her eagerly anticipated new novel, *Go Gentle*, was published in late April.

With work appearing in publications like *The New Yorker*, *Los Angeles Times*, *The New York Times*, and *The Huffington Post*, Semple continues to charm readers worldwide, and her novels have been translated into more than 40 languages.

Born in Santa Monica, Semple grew up partly in Spain and later in Los Angeles and Aspen, Colorado. She is the daughter of screenwriter Lorenzo Semple Jr., best known for writing the pilot for the *Batman* television series.

Semple earned a B.A. in English from Barnard College. She now lives in New York City.





ANDREW ROSS SORKIN

Andrew Ross Sorkin is one of the most prominent voices in finance and business journalism, and his new book, *1929*, has been hailed by *The Wall Street Journal* as “one of the best narrative histories [we’ve] read.”

Sorkin’s previous blockbuster bestseller, *Too Big to Fail*, chronicled the events of the 2008 financial crisis and was adapted into an HBO movie in 2011. He is also the co-creator of the acclaimed Showtime drama *Billions*.

Sorkin is a frequent guest on national television and radio programs and a lecturer at universities across the country. He has appeared on NBC’s *The Today Show*, PBS’s *NewsHour*, HBO’s *Real Time with Bill Maher*, NPR’s *Talk of the Nation*, and many others.

Sorkin joined *The New York Times* as a student intern while still in high school and published dozens of articles for the paper while still an undergraduate at Cornell University. After university, he started at *The Times* full-time, initially covering mergers and acquisitions from London, and rapidly establishing himself as one of the leading voices in financial journalism.

Sorkin serves as a financial columnist at *The New York Times*, where he is also the founder and editor-at-large of *DealBook*, and co-anchors CNBC’s *Squawk Box*. Over the years, Sorkin has been at the forefront of Wall Street news, and he is recognized as one of the preeminent interviewers of business leaders, policymakers, and cultural figures.

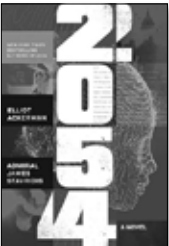
ADMIRAL JAMES STAVRIDIS

Admiral James Stavridis’ legendary 37-year career includes serving as the first naval Supreme Allied Commander of NATO (2009–2013), overseeing military operations in Afghanistan, Libya, Syria, the Balkans, and global counter-piracy initiatives. He also led U.S. Southern Command, directing American military activities throughout Latin America (2006–2009). Stavridis commanded the USS Barry, Destroyer Squadron 21, and the Enterprise Carrier Strike Group, earning the Battenberg Cup and Navy League John Paul Jones Award for inspirational leadership.

Admiral Stavridis played key roles in strategic planning for the Navy, as senior military assistant to top Pentagon officials, and led the Navy’s operational innovation group, Deep Blue, following 9/11. After retiring, Stavridis served as Dean of the Fletcher School at Tufts University and remains a prominent author, speaker, and expert in global affairs, exemplifying exceptional leadership and visionary thinking in both military and civilian spheres.

Writing through the lens of global geopolitics and the security challenges in the late 21st century, Admiral Stavridis is the bestselling author of *2034: A Novel of the Next World War*, *2054: A Novel*, and the new follow-up, *2084: A Novel of the Climate War*, with co-writer Elliot Ackerman.

Admiral Stavridis graduated from the U.S. Naval Academy, and his career is marked by more than 50 medals, including 28 from foreign nations, and his commitment to international partnership, military innovation, and security.



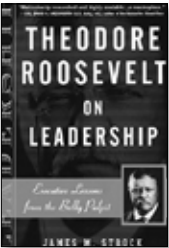


JAMES STROCK

James Strock is a bestselling author of four books on service, politics, and leadership, including *Theodore Roosevelt on Leadership: Executive Lessons from the Bully Pulpit* and *Disrupt Politics: Reset Washington*. He writes the ‘Next Nationalism’ on Substack and hosts the ‘Serve to Lead’ podcast.



Strock tours the country speaking on these topics. In addition to being a dynamic writer and speaker, he is an entrepreneur and reformer in business and government. Strock’s latest book, *Serve to Lead 2.0: 21st Century Leaders Manual*, implores organizations and individuals to achieve their greatest potential—and explains exactly how they can.



Strock served as the founding secretary of the California Environmental Protection Agency and as chief law enforcement officer of the United States EPA. Strock also serves as a trustee of the Theodore Roosevelt Association and a member of the Council on Foreign Relations.

Strock received a bachelor’s degree from Harvard College (Phi Beta Kappa) and a juris doctor from Harvard Law School. He subsequently attended New College, Oxford for a year, sponsored by the Ambassadorial Scholarships program of Rotary International. He served to captain in the reserves, Judge Advocate General of the U.S. Army, 1989-96. He received the Ross Essay Prize of the American Bar Association in 1985.



JAMES WANG

James Wang is a venture capitalist and technologist at the forefront of the deep-tech revolution. As General Partner at Creative Ventures, he leads investments in artificial intelligence, synthetic biology, and advanced materials — technologies redefining how humanity works, heals, and creates. Since 2016, his fund has backed visionary founders aiming to solve some of the 21st century’s toughest problems.



Before venture capital, Wang helped shape strategies at Bridgewater Associates, the world’s largest hedge fund, and later joined X, Google’s moonshot lab, where he supported bold experiments pushing science fiction toward reality. Today, he serves on the boards of pioneering companies in AI, healthcare, and robotics, championing innovation that scales responsibly.

A thought leader and educator, Wang is a regular guest lecturer at UC Berkeley, where he speaks about entrepreneurship and startup financing. His widely read Substack, *Weighty Thoughts*, explores the intersection of technology, economics, and society. His new book, *What You Need to Know About AI*, is a clear and compelling guide to the forces shaping our intelligent future.

Wang received his undergraduate degree from Dartmouth College, his master’s of science in computer science from Georgia Tech, and his MBA from U.C. Berkeley.

Ginny Freeman has spent her life trying to engage both the left and right sides of her brain! After graduating from Purdue University with a BS in Business, she was recruited by Arthur Andersen & Company, then the largest accounting firm in the world, to work as a programmer in their consulting group in their Chicago Headquarters.

She relocated to San Francisco and worked for Bank of America, then the largest bank in the world, as a technical support representative, converting bank customers from manual payroll systems to the bank's computerized payroll system.

She then joined IBM, then the largest computer company in the world, where she had an 18-year career in sales, staff, and management. One of the most memorable assignments was selling the newly invented IBM Personal Computers from a retail store in downtown San Francisco, much like today's Apple Stores with Genius Bars.

After 22 years in the corporate world, Ginny became self-employed and spent the next 15 years as a Personal Assistant to high net worth families and non-profits doing both creative and technical work; her last contract lasted nine years.

Through the Academy of Arts online study, she learned Photoshop, then was retained by a prominent SF family to manage the digital capture, storage, printing, and binding of over 15,000 images from a set of family photo albums that spanned 50 years.

Founder & President of Book Passage

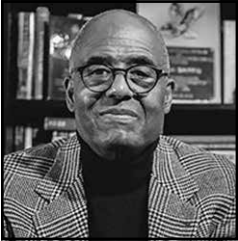
Elaine Petrocelli, who founded Book Passage bookstore 50 years ago, assists in selecting and securing authors to participate in the Festival.

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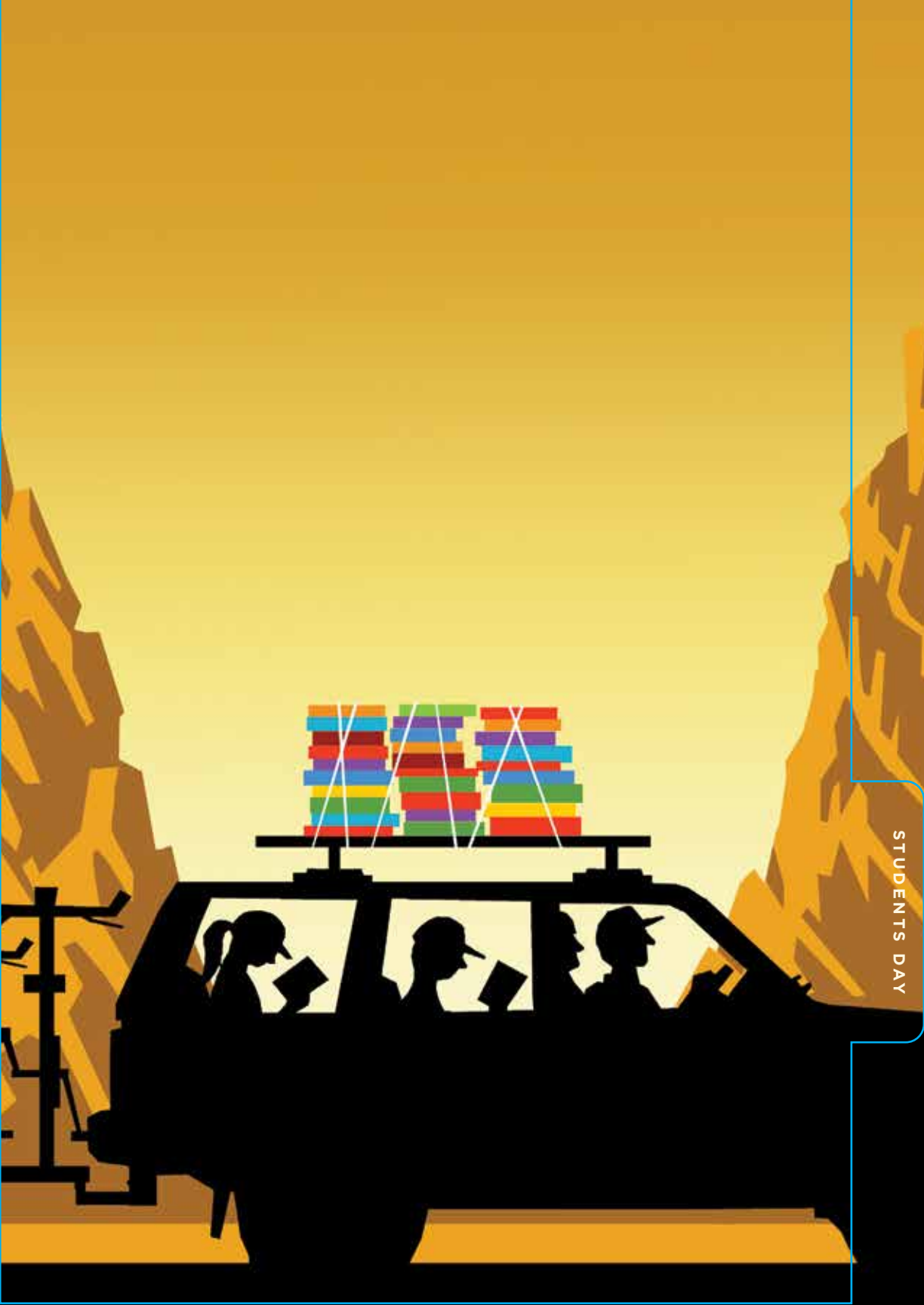

Since the first year of the Festival, co-founders Ginny and David Freeman's vision has included introducing Sonoma Valley students to the power of the written word and the extraordinary impact of new ideas through engaging with today's top speakers and thought leaders. Horizons open, imaginations awaken, minds expand and dreams are born. That is the magic of the Sonoma Valley Authors Festival Students Day.

In a time when students' eyes are increasingly drawn toward screens for information and even affirmation, books open a reader's mind to a new world of possibility and provide a gateway to explore new ideas, cultures and experiences.

The first annual Students Day was held on May 4, 2018, when select authors and visionaries in science, technology and medicine spoke with 2,700 middle and high school students. Almost 3,000 books written by the presenting authors were given free to the students, all paid for with private donations.

Since that day, the Sonoma Valley Authors Festival has hosted Students Day at Sonoma Valley High School with approximately 1,000-5,000 books written by the presenting authors given away each year, for a total of 20,000 books to date, all paid for with private funds. The only exception was 2020, due to COVID.

This year, Students Day will be held on Friday, May 1, at Sonoma Valley High School. Bestselling author Bryan Burrough, famed graphic designer Craig Frazier, acclaimed astrophysicist Alex Filippenko, award-winning sports reporter Michelle Kaufman, motivational speaker J.R. Martinez, AI entrepreneur James Wang, and tech executive turned farmer Shalie Jonker, will speak to students.
